## Stating an opinion

- In my opinion...
- The way I see it...
- If you want my honest opinion....
- According to Lisa...
- As far as I'm concerned...
- If you ask me...
- Personally
- I think,
- I believe,
- I reckon

## Asking for an opinion

- What's your idea?
- What are your thoughts on all of this?
- How do you feel about that?
- Do you have anything to say about this?
- What do you think?
- Do you agree?
- Wouldn't you say?

## Expressing agreement

- I agree with you 100 percent.

- I couldn't agree with you more.
- That's so true.
- That's for sure.
- You're absolutely right.
- Absolutely.
- Definitely.
- That's exactly how I feel.
- Exactly.
- I'm afraid I agree with James.
- No doubt about it.
- (weak) I suppose so / I guess so.
- You have a point there.
- I was just going to say that.
- I see what you mean.

### Expressing disagreement

- I don't think so.
- I'm afraid I disagree.
- I beg to differ.
- Not necessarily.
- That's not always true.
- That's not always the case.
- No, I'm not so sure about that.
- Without wanting to criticize.
- (strong) No way.
- (strong) I totally disagree.

### Interruptions

- Can I add something here?
- Is it okay if I jump in for a second?
- If I might add something...

- Sorry to interrupt, but...
- (after accidentally interrupting someone) Sorry, go ahead / Sorry, you were saying...
- (after being interrupted) You didn't let me finish.
